

MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: LICENSE REVIEW BOARD ("LRB") APPOINTEE

At the May 17, 2004 General Meeting, I announced that Mr. Warren Bruno had notified me in writing that he was stepping down as the President's designee to the License Review Board and that I was entertaining nominations to fill his unexpired term.

Of all the boards and commissions that APAB has a voice on, I consider this board to be the most important because the decisions made by this body directly affect the quality of life in our neighborhoods. For this reason, although it is in my purview to either occupy this seat myself or personally appoint someone, I have decided that it would be more appropriate to receive nominations from the body at-large.


The LRB not only hears applications for the sale of alcohol at restaurants, grocery stores and convenience stores, but also applications for adult entertainment establishments, booting companies, and other occupations which require criminal background investigations by the Atlanta Police Department. Under the leadership of Mr. Barney Simms, it has become more neighborhood friendly and more sensitive to the desires and wishes of residents.

Although the majority of alcohol license-related matters before the LRB have to do with bars and restaurants, it is my belief that the issues surrounding convenience stores and package stores faced by neighborhoods south of Ponce de Leon, especially those south of I-20, need a stronger voice on the board than they have now. Further, I note that the board's current composition does not include representation from those west-northwest areas plagued with beer and wine at convenience and small "grocery" stores.

Keeping that in mind, I ask that you search your neighborhoods for an individual who (a) is their own person, (b) is not easily swayed from their convictions, (c) can be fair but firm when required; (d) can devote 26 Tuesday evenings from 5 pm until the meeting is concluded (sometimes as late as midnight), (e) can pass a criminal background check and (f) is willing to provide APAB with periodic reports. Please provide me, no later than Friday, June 4, 2004, their name, full contact information, a short biography and reason why you believe they should be appointed. I would prefer you send this information electronically to min_yin@bellsouth.net. If that is not possible, please mail it to me at 685 Cooper Street, S.W., #13, Atlanta, GA 30315.

Thank you, in advance, for your assistance in selecting an individual for this most important position.

M. M. (Peggy) Harper

Peggy Harper is a 30 year resident of Atlanta and currently lives in the Mechanicsville Neighborhood, one of Atlanta's oldest residential areas. Peggy came to Atlanta from her native Florida where, in addition to a professional life in the insurance and construction industry, she worked with her Morehouse-educated father who was a very active community organizer throughout the East, Midwest and South, since the middle 1920s, focusing on the development of affordable housing and economic opportunities. As a second generation community activist, she naturally gravitated toward educational opportunities that would increase her knowledge and understanding of community economic development which led to a 3 year scholarship to participate in a unique program called "Work-Place-Folk" during her secondary education years. Through this program, she was able to study first hand the results of both community development and community decline in Europe and North America.

During her early years in Atlanta, Ms. Harper was involved in the construction of the East-West line of MARTA as an employee of Parsons, Brinkerhoff and Tutor's Train Control Signal Division and represented PBT on the MARTA system-wide Critical Path Analysis Team. She held administrative and program management positions at Georgia Institute of Technology and has also been involved with corporate recruiting and marketing for several fortune 500 companies based in Atlanta.

Ms. Harper attended Agnes Scott College in Decatur, GA, through their Return-To-College program, and, in 1989, received a Bachelor of Arts in Economics, with a concentration in Developmental Economics and an undeclared minor in Asian/African History. While at Agnes Scott, she participated in the college's Global Awareness program, earning a scholarship to study economic development in the Republic of China. Her paper, *Economic Growth and Development in Taiwan: The Progeny of an Ideological Marriage*, was chosen for presentation at the 1988 State of Georgia Undergraduate Conference on Asian Studies held at Spelman College.

Ms. Harper now devotes her time to community economic and human capacity development. Peggy has held several offices in the Mechanicsville Civic Association, the most recent being Vice President, and is the neighborhood historian. She also served as the neighborhood's representative to the Atlanta Community Empowerment Corporation's Community Empowerment Advisory Board (CEAB) and is a founding member of the Mechanicsville Ministerial Alliance. She is the President of Neighborhood Planning Unit V (NPU-V), and has been NPU's representative to the Atlanta Planning and Advisory Board (APAB) since 2002.
