**A RESOLUTION
BY FINANCE/EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

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WHEREAS, the City of Atlanta (“City”) is a finalist for a Code for America technology fellowship, selected from over 50 city applications for one of 8-10 fellowship winners; and

WHEREAS, the City has a priority to improve the means of citizen engagement, transparency and efficiencies; and

WHEREAS, Code for America is the only 501(c)(3) that pairs talented, rigorously selected technologists with governments for an 11-month program to work collaboratively with their city partners to help improve their city through innovative technology and processes, and is well-recognized for the innovative and meaningful impact its technology fellowships have had on cities awarded, such as Austin (prepared.ly), Boston (Adopt-a-Hydrant, DiscoverBPS), New Orleans(BlightStatus), New York (Recovers), Philadelphia (Textizen, Neighborhow), Santa Cruz (Open Counter); and

WHEREAS, the Chief Procurement Officer has determined that Code for America is a Special Procurement for the purpose of providing an innovative technology fellowship to develop solutions to increase civic engagement, transparency and efficiencies as defined in Atlanta City Code Section 2-1191.1; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Chief Operating Officer recommends entering into an agreement with Code for America for a fellowship to develop solutions to increase civic engagement, transparency and efficiencies, for a term of one (1) year, in the annual amount of One Hundred and Eighty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$180,000.00) and the non-monetary benefit of providing the Code for America Fellows with office space, utilities and local phone service (the “Agreement”); and

WHEREAS, entering into the Agreement with Code for America is in the best interest of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA, that the Mayor is authorized to enter into the Special Procurement Agreement with Code for America for a technology to develop solutions to increase civic engagement, transparency and efficiencies, on behalf of the Office of the Chief Operating Officer for a term of one (1) year, in the amount of One Hundred and Eighty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$180,000.00) and the non-monetary benefit of providing the Code for America Fellows with office space, utilities and local phone service.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all annual expenses associated with the fellowship activities, on behalf of the Chief Operating Officer, be charged to and paid from 1001 (GENERAL FUND) 040301 (OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER) 5212001 (CONSULTANT/PROFESSIONAL SERVICES) 1320000 (CHIEF EXECUTIVE).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Attorney, or her designee is hereby authorized to prepare the Agreement for execution by the Mayor.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Agreement will not become binding upon the City, and the City shall incur no liability upon same until contract has been approved by the City Attorney as to form, executed by the Mayor, attested to by the Municipal Clerk, and delivered to Code for America.

The City of Atlanta's Innovation Delivery Team, housed in the Mayor's Office, is charged with developing solutions to major urban challenges. The team is currently developing and implementing two programs: (1) reducing street homelessness and (2) improving customer service, including introducing 311 to Atlanta.

The Innovation Delivery Team is seeking innovative technology support for the customer service initiative: in particular for developing solutions to enhance civic engagement, transparency and efficiencies. On behalf of the City of Atlanta, we have applied for and been named a finalist for a Code for America technology fellowship. This is an honor for the City of Atlanta: we were one of 50 cities who applied for 8-10 fellowship placements.

Code for America is the only 501(c)(3) that pairs talented technologists with governments for an 11-month program to work collaboratively with their city partners to help improve their city through innovative technology and processes, and is well-recognized for the innovative and meaningful impact its technology fellowships have had on cities awarded. The fellowship provides a small team of experienced technologists screened through a rigorous recruiting program. The cost of the fellowship to the City of Atlanta will be \$180,000.00 for one year Code for America foundation funding and matching grants greatly subsidize the cost of the fellows.

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The Innovation Delivery Team finds Code for America uniquely qualified for reasons among the following:

- 501(c)3 approach significantly subsidizes the cost of the resources: minimum of a \$180K matching grant will also be supporting the fellowship
- Unique talent pipeline: no other national technology/innovation public service resource program has come to our attention despite Google searches and inquiries with CIO's/CTO's in Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago (all of whom have been Code for America cities and each only recommended Code for America for our needs):

- Unique opportunity for resource collaboration across 8-10 cities. The City of Atlanta fellows will participate in a "class" of fellows serving additional cities. This class is highly collaborative – they will be sharing solutions and approaches throughout the fellowship.
- Solutions legacy: Code for America fellowships have been underway for several years, and they now have a robust library and catalogue of approaches and solutions built on-the-ground with cities in past fellowships that are in production/active use by other cities that the current fellows can draw from – these solutions are also open source software and have no incremental cost.
- Well-recognized program and brand (see Appendix)

We would like to procure the Code for America Fellowship on a contract basis to provide technology solutions to increase civic engagement, transparency and efficiencies for the City of Atlanta. The costs would be up to \$180K through December 2014.

Code for America: An elegant solution for government IT problems

Parents in Boston complained bitterly about the needlessly complex enrollment process for public schools. To sign up their children for school, parents were forced to navigate a Byzantine 28-page pamphlet seemingly designed to confuse. What's more, the process made it difficult for parents to make smart choices about schools based on criteria they considered important, such as proximity and user ratings.

But this year, Joel Mahoney, a Code for America fellow taking a break from a tech career as a chief technology officer and entrepreneur, saw the problem, mapped out a solution and wrote a Web application, Discover BPS, that has a simple, easy-to-use interface and includes all manner of sorting capabilities.

He did this in two months, by himself.

Under normal circumstances, getting something such as that done in the Boston government would take two years, between requests for proposals, procurement rules and bidding processes. But Mahoney's background set him apart, and he was already "procured" by the city. This meant that as soon as the office of Mayor Thomas M. Menino (D) explained the problem to Mahoney, he could get to work, talking to parents and building a prototype. The Boston city government saved tens, if not hundreds, of thousands of dollars in costs for private contractors or man-hours for their own software developers. Most important, the problem was quickly solved to the satisfaction of all parties.

Code for America is the technology world's equivalent of the Peace Corps or Teach for America. The premise is simple and elegant. America's cities need technology help. State, federal and local governments spend hundreds of billions of dollars each year on IT systems and solutions. But a significant percentage of this money is wasted fighting red tape, jumping through bureaucratic hoops or paying for poor execution by legacy government contractors who manage to drag out simple projects and turn them into money pits.

Code for America, a nonprofit group started by Jennifer Pahlka, who formerly ran the Gov 2.0 and Web 2.0 technology shows for conference and publication giant UBM TechWeb, offers an alternative to the old, broken path of government IT. Young technophiles from Google and Microsoft apply to spend a year of their time working on problems they discover as on-site fellows in cities across the country. They bring fresh blood to the solution process, deliver agile coding and software development skills, and frequently offer new perspectives on the latest technology — something that is often sorely lacking from municipal government IT programs. This is a win-win for cities that need help and for technologists that want to give back and contribute to lower government costs and the delivery of improved government service.

Code for America matches fellows with cities in the program, publicizes their efforts, and monitors their progress. The cities get highly skilled coders — who might make six-figure salaries in the private sector.... The citizens get improved government services.

But the benefits go beyond the delivery of a particular project. The code for all projects is open source and made available to any city or government entity. This means state and local governments gain a growing repository of well-written, modern code that, in many cases, will directly address specific programmatic needs common to governments providing services to the public. This is already proving to be a great way to solve problems quickly and at minimal cost.

For example, in Boston, one of three cities in the program last year, another fellow, Erik Michaels-Ober, started thinking about the city's several thousand fire hydrants, which have to be dug out of the snow every winter. Michaels-Ober believed that residents living near the hydrants might be willing to dig them out. So he crafted a simple Web application to encourage Bostonians to claim a hydrant using a simple map interface on their desktop or mobile browser. To drive usage, he added game dynamics, allowing citizens to name their hydrants or "steal" other players' hydrants if they failed to dig them out in a timely fashion. The "crowd-sourced" game, Adopt-a-Hydrant, has saved Bostonians a significant amount of government spending and made the city a safer place.

Eight months later and nearly 6,000 miles away, the City of Honolulu IT director, Forest Frizzell, found the Adopt-a-Hydrant project on Code for America's public code repository. He thought the app could quickly be rescripted to encourage Honolulu residents to maintain the tsunami sirens on the beach. These sirens are rendered inoperable when thieves steal the batteries. Instead of increasing the frequency of city maintenance crews monitoring, which would raise costs to the city, Frizzell is letting any citizen with a smartphone or a Web browser check for batteries and record their findings. In an era of diminished state and local taxes, it might, indeed, take a village — and an army of benevolent coders — to keep the lights on, the potholes patched, the sirens blaring and the hydrants flowing.

Code for America is expanding to eight cities in 2012. Let's hope this expansion foretells a government technology revolution that is long overdue. The status quo of bloated, inefficient technology management for government is no longer acceptable.


Pursuant to Atlanta City Code Section 2-1191.1, the Chief Procurement Officer may initiate a procurement above the small purchase amount specified in Section 2-1190 where he determines that an unusual or unique situation exists that make the application of all requirements of competitive sealed bidding or competitive sealed proposals contrary to the public interest. Such procurement does not technically qualify as sole source procurement under Code Section 2-1191. Any special procurement under this Section is conducted with such competition as practicable under the circumstances. The Chief Procurement Officer in the contract file shall include a written determination of the basis for the procurement and for the selection of the particular contractor.

This special procurement request is to procure the Technological Solutions Development services for Increased Citizen Engagement, Transparency and Efficiency from the Code for America organization on behalf of the Chief Operating Officer, Mayor's Office. The City of Atlanta ("City") is a finalist for a Code for America technology fellowship, selected from over fifty (50) city applications for one of 8-10 fellowship winners. The cost of the fellowship to the City will be \$180,000.00.

Having conducted an investigation of the available sources regarding the materials, goods and/or services stipulated herein pursuant to § 2-1191.1 of the City of Atlanta Code of Ordinances, Special Procurement and my findings are the following:

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EXPECTATIONS OF OUR CITY PARTNERS

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Strong leadership supporting the program

By the nature of our program – introducing a different culture and new approaches to problem solving – we rely on strong leadership from our partners to support the program when we hit bumps in the road. Strong leaders will publicly support the Code for America program and gain broad support for the program from city leadership.

Flexibility and allowance for emergent outcomes

During the residency phase the fellows will connect with and learn from the city. They will conduct extensive research throughout the month of February and build their product hypothesis and eventual designs on that research. This requires flexibility and openness to the variety of possibilities and apps that will result. Research coupled with interviews with city leaders and the community generate impressive emergent outcomes that lead to very powerful tools.

Community involvement in the process

Strong community involvement is essential to sustaining the impacts of our fellowship program in the city. Sometimes a project sponsor may not be a city hall staffer, rather a community group or resident — this often helps to ensure a apps sustainability within the city. An engaged and supportive community helps to ensure that Code for America's impact remains long after the fellows leave and the official partnership with the city has ended.

Planning for longer term sustainability

The fellowship program will result in a number of various outputs throughout the year. Some of those outputs will be applications. The city needs to create and implement an adoption and sustainability plan for the applications. This will require significant planning, and in some cases additional funds for hosting the and/or on-going maintenance of applications. Some other outputs of the program, such as new development processes, may require continued outreach with the community for user research and testing. Sustainability is challenging and it's something that we will address throughout the fellowship program.

City leaders' time commitment

The Code for America fellowship is a partnership that requires city leaders to dedicate time to the program. The two primary roles in the partnership, primary contact and project sponsors, can require anywhere between 5 and 10 percent of one's time during the program. For project sponsors the time commitment could be limited to only three weeks, or as long as six months, depending on the nature of the project.

Funding for the fellowship program


Code for America's funding model is based on partner cities contributing a portion of the total costs of the program. Currently, foundations and other donors fund the remaining program costs. This allows cities to pay only for the actual costs of the fellows (stipends, benefits, and travel). City teams include three fellows at the participation fee for a city is \$180,000, an additional \$60,000 is required for each additional fellow.

To cover the additional program costs associated with the fellowship, cities are required to identify potential local funding sources to cover the remaining program costs.

Commitment to reuse

The hard work of the fellows and city partners should benefit other local governments across the country. We expect that they city partners participate in Civic Commons and assist in spreading applications to other cities.


