About the organization: Our statewide coalition formed at the request of the Georgia Department of Agriculture and the Georgia Emergency Management Agency (GEMA). We then joined the Georgia Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (GAVOAD) making Georgia, by law, the first state to allow animals in disaster shelters. We are known for The Animal Protection Act of 2000 that made some heinous acts of animal cruelty a felony, The Dog and Cat Sterilization Program, managed by the GDA, that you voted on in 2002 and The Dog and Cat Check-Off for taxes. We were also instrumental in the passage of Veterinary Practice Act, Child Endangerment and others as well as stopping bad legislation.
