



# President's Message



*The President of the Council presides at meetings of the Atlanta City Council and votes only in the case of a tie vote of the Council. He or she is charged with appointing the members and chairpersons of Council standing committees and exercises all powers and discharge all duties of the mayor in the case of a vacancy in the office of mayor or during the disability of the mayor.*

## Greetings,

Fiscal accountability and enhanced quality of life were the framework for the accomplishments made by Atlanta City Council in 2011. The citizens of Atlanta have elected a dynamic group of individuals whose organic leadership has lead to some of the ground-breaking activities undertaken over the course of the year. We boldly tackled many of the issues that, if left untouched, would have adversely affected the city of generations to come. Through raising tough questions, and making often tough decisions, we not only realigned the city's finances to reflect the changing economy, we also made changes to many of the city's codes and ordinances to enhance the quality of life for our citizens and allocated more funds to public safety initiatives.

Perhaps the greatest accomplishment of this sitting Council was the overhaul of the City's pension system. While the pension reform conversation was long and tedious, it was the right thing to do at the right time. The new system is fair to our hard working employees and their families. But equally as important, it is fair to our citizens and it ensures the city maintains the resources needed to deliver services to the public which we serve.

The comprehensive pension reform plan created tangible cost savings the first year. The measure is projected to save the city millions of dollars over 30 years.

While pension reform will likely become this Council's greatest accomplishment of 2011, it is certainly only one of the many achievements made by this body of leaders. Throughout the year, the Council focused on many of the issues that citizens comment about when we are in the community, or when you call our offices. To that end, we passed an ordinance requiring certain vacant properties to be registered with the city; made allowances for local farmers markets; protected the integrity of our historic neighborhoods; and, enhanced our neighborhoods through access to public art.

Of course, these are only highlights from 2011. Your Atlanta City Council had many more achievements over the course of the year, and we will continue our work into 2012 and beyond, in an effort to make the city of Atlanta a model city in which to live, work and raise a family.





# Atlanta City Council



## Our Mission

*Dedicated to Government Oversight and Quality Constituent Services*

The City Council is the chief policy making body for the City of Atlanta. The Council's mission is to ensure that Atlanta is lead by a ground-breaking, strong, and capable group of leaders that work for the good of all citizens across the city. As a legislative body, the council's main role is to make laws. In addition, the Council has oversight of multiple agencies, boards, and commissions. The Atlanta City Council is comprised of 15 members and is led by Council President Caesar C. Mitchell. Each member of the Atlanta City Council tirelessly works to improve the lives of Atlanta's citizens. Together, they work to ensure safer and cleaner streets, bolster Atlanta's economy, and institute many community-based programs. Working hand in hand with Atlanta's mayor and the members of the executive branch, the Council plays a key part in the budget process and financial well being of Atlanta.

## Government Oversight

In addition to legislation, the Atlanta City Council works hard to ensure that city government works for its citizens. Through the various Council Committees the council assesses various government programs and agencies. Each year, the Council is in charge of holding budget hearings in which the City's budget, recommended by the Mayor, is strictly reviewed prior to being voted on by the Council.

## Constituent Services

# How Your City Council Works

The legislative body, comprised of the Council, makes the laws that govern the city. It is responsible for the development of policies which serve as operational standards and establishes the parameters for the administration of city government.

A new city charter was enacted in 1996 that reduced the representation of Council to 12 districts and three at large posts -- effective January 1998.

The 1974 Charter resulted in many changes in Atlanta City government. Prior to its adoption, the legislative body was called the Board of Aldermen and each alderman was elected citywide. The 1974 charter changed the Board of Aldermen to the City Council; the vice-mayor to the president of the Council; and established 12 Council members to be elected from individual districts and six at-large posts. The administration of the day-to-day operation of city government was transferred to the executive branch, and legislative authority was vested in the Council. This system allows the Council to maintain a strong system of checks and balances.

Legislation takes two forms -- ordinances and resolutions. An ordinance establishes a permanent rule of government. Every official act of the Council, having the force and effect of law, must be an ordinance. Ordinances must be read before full Council at two regular meetings. There are exceptions, for example, a City Charter amendment requires three readings.

Resolutions usually express intent or support of various projects and enterprises, or establish legislative policy of a general nature. Resolutions need be read only once and can be introduced and adopted at the same meeting.

## Standing Committees

The standing committees of the Atlanta City Council meet to consider legislation and to make recommendations on each item. The Committees then report their actions to the full Council. More than 150 pieces of legislation are handled per meeting.

Citizens have the opportunity to appear before a standing committee and to express their views on any piece of legislation. (Comments from the public on matters related to zoning changes are heard by the Zoning Review Board, an independent body comprised of appointed city residents.

## Legislative Process

Legislation can be introduced on the floor of Council by a Councilmember as a personal paper, or can come through a standing committee. In either case, almost all legislation goes before a committee for discussion at some time.

After a paper has been through the committee process, the full Council votes on it. The Council may accept or reject the committee's recommendations. A majority vote is needed for adoption.

When a paper is adopted by the Council, it goes to the Mayor for signature. The paper must be approved or vetoed within seven days. If not signed or vetoed within that period, it automatically becomes law. If vetoed, the Council can override a mayoral veto with a two-thirds majority vote.

## About the Atlanta City Council

The president of the City Council is elected from the city at-large (city-wide). The Council consists of 15 members, 12 elected from single-member districts and three elected at-large.

The Council president presides at all meetings of the Council and votes in the case of a tie. The president of Council appoints chairs and members of the various committees, subject to rejection by a majority of the Council.

The Council president exercises all powers and discharges all duties of the mayor in case of a vacancy in that office or during the disability of the mayor.

Councilmembers are elected to four-year terms commencing with the first Monday in January. The next Atlanta City Council will take office in January 2014.

The members of the Council elect a president pro tempore each year to serve a one-year term beginning with the first meeting in January. The president pro tempore presides over the Council meetings in the president's absence.

Atlanta City Councilmembers are paid an annual salary of \$39,473. The Council president is paid \$40,997 annually. Salaries are determined by an independent committee of city residents.





The Finance/Executive Committee of the Atlanta City Council under the leadership of Councilmember Yolanda Adrean worked tirelessly on behalf of the citizens and employees of the City of Atlanta during 2011. The Finance/Executive Committee met its annual responsibilities of financial oversight, which includes conducting budget hearings and meetings regarding budget goals and objectives, and the responsibility of reviewing and acting on any legislation that impacts the financial health of the City. Most notably were financing initiatives by the Departments of Aviation and Watershed Management. The Committee held a number of presentations designed to inform and educate the public on the fiscal health of the City, such as briefings on the annual audit, follow-up on Management Letter recommendations and results of audits performed by the City's Internal Auditor.

The Committee implemented quarterly presentations which allowed the Chief Financial Officer to provide an in depth analysis of revenues and expenditures compared to the approved budget, as well as the cost and benefits of approved initiatives. During 2011 the Committee was also challenged with the daunting task of dealing with pension reform initiatives, which culminated with the passage of Ordinance 11-O-0672.

- Approved sweeping reforms to the city's three pension plans by raising the pension contribution of current employees by 5% of compensation; reducing the multiplier used to calculate pension benefits of future employees to 1%; reducing the maximum cost of living adjustment of pension benefits of future employees to 1%; clarifying that pension benefits accrued by an employee prior to November 1, 2011 shall remain unchanged; clarifying that the pension changes set forth in Section 62 do not apply to active employees and elected officials hired or elected prior to January 1, 1984; clarifying that the pension benefits of employees who retired prior to November 1, 2011 shall remain unchanged.
- Authorized the City of Atlanta Internal Auditor to enter into a Contractual Agreement with KPMG LLP for an audit of the City of Atlanta Financial Statements.

## SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS...continued

- Approved an ordinance creating the 2010C Airport General Revenue Refunding Bond Fund and amending the FY 2011 Budget by adding to anticipations and appropriations Bond Proceeds in the aggregated principal amount of \$524,045,000.
- Appropriated \$4,500,000 from the City of Atlanta Northwest Atlanta (Perry/Bolton) Tax Allocation District for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new Northwest Atlanta Fire Station, a Mini-Police Precinct, and a Community Assembly Room.
- Authorized a contract renewal with Trinity Service Group, Inc. in the amount of \$982,000.00. This renewal provided all food, labor, supplies and materials necessary for the preparation of meal for detainees in the Atlanta City Detention Center (ACDC).
- Authorized Allied Aviation Fueling of Atlanta, Inc. to provide and the City of Atlanta to accept fuel storage facility and fueling facility management and operation services at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport on a month to month basis.
- Authorized the issuance of \$275,000,000 in Non-AMT and \$250,000,000 in AMT Refunding Revenue bonds on behalf of Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport. The bond issues were purposed to refund various outstanding bonds related to the Airport Capital Program.
- The Committee approved an amendment to the Water and Wastewater Revenue Fund Budget, in the amount of \$1,708,522. The Budget amendment was necessary to accommodate the move of the Department of Watershed Management to 72 Marietta Street. The site at 72 Marietta Street, was donated to the City of Atlanta by the Atlanta Journal Constitution at the end of 2010, and will become the headquarters of the Department of Watershed Management.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into a cooperative purchasing agreement with the Atlanta Gas Light Company for Natural Gas and Energy Management Services on behalf of the Division of Sustainability in the amount of \$7,900,000.

- Continued to supervise and monitor the design and implementation of the Electronic Legislative Management System (ELMS).
- Established emergency communications protocol.
- Held a session on First Aid Training for City of Atlanta employees.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract among the City of Atlanta, the Atlanta Board of Education and Fulton County for a special election held on November 8, 2011, and a run-off election on December 6, 2011 to fill the vacancy in the Atlanta Board of Education District Two (2) position; required that the Atlanta Board of Education pay all costs and expenses of the special election to Fulton County and the City of Atlanta.




- Held a work session on city court operations and toured the Municipal Court facilities.
- Held a joint work session with the Finance and Executive Committee regarding the city audit of Municipal Court operations.
- Conducted a tour of the new E911 Center.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of a grant award in the amount of \$157,000 from the U. S. Department of Justice Community Capacity Development Office and \$125,000 from the City of Atlanta for a total of \$282,000 for the continuation of the Weed and Seed Strategy in the English Avenue Community.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of \$2,938,599 in grant funds from the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, for the purpose of continuing the Atlanta High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Task Force efforts to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations in the city.

- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of \$376,760 in grant funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program for the purpose of supporting the Atlanta Smoke Alarm Program.
- Approved a substitute ordinance authorizing the acceptance of \$829,420 for the FY 2011 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Award from the United States Department of Justice.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor, on behalf of the City of Atlanta Municipal Court, to execute temporary service contracts with sixteen (16) retired City of Atlanta (“City”) Police Officers and four (4) Security Officers, for the purpose of providing Professional Security Services at the Municipal Court of Atlanta for a period of one (1) year in FY 2012, in an amount not to exceed \$742,093.

## SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS...continued

- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of a \$481,965 sub-grant from the United States Department of Homeland Security to aid the City of Atlanta in its ongoing effort to protect itself from terrorist bomb attacks, through the purchase of specialized equipment for the Department of Police's Special Weapons and Tactics Unit.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of a \$319,500 sub-grant from the United States Department of Homeland Security to aid the City of Atlanta's ongoing efforts to protect itself from terrorist attacks, through the purchase of specialized equipment for the Department of Police Airport Explosive Ordinance Disposal.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to accept a grant from the U. S. Department of Homeland Security in the amount of \$9,793,068 for the purpose of hiring 75 new firefighter positions.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to apply for and accept a grant from the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy in the amount of \$5,066,481 for the purpose of disrupting and dismantling illegal drug trafficking organizations in the city.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to apply for and accept funding in the amount of up to \$2,000,200 from the Department of Justice for Atlanta's Anti-Violence Strategy Project.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the acceptance of \$2,127,922 in grant funds from the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy for the purpose of continuing the Atlanta High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Task Force efforts to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations in the city.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor, on behalf of the Department of Police, to apply for and accept a grant from the U. S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance, in the amount of \$829,420, for the purpose of supporting law enforcement and criminal justice activities.



*The Transportation Committee recommends on matters pertaining to transportation, generally, including the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority (MARTA). One of its main functions is overseeing the Department of Aviation which operates Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, the world's busiest airport. The Transportation Committee also has purview over the Department of Public Works' Bureau of Traffic and Transportation, whose task it is to perform traffic studies, install traffic signage and traffic calming devices throughout the city, etc.*

- Approved an ordinance eliminating the two-hour parking exemption for non-permitted vehicles in residential permit parking areas.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute an amendment to a lease agreement with Delta Airlines, Inc. to allow the airlines to complete a Delta Sky Club in the Maynard Holbrook Jackson International Terminal for a cost of \$6,261,000; to allow Delta to make additional tenant improvements for Delta, Korean Airlines Company and KLM/Air France within the new terminal at a cost of \$10,600,000; and to allow for completion of a bag belt for Delta to the parking deck at the new terminal for a cost not to exceed \$2,000,000.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute a maintenance agreement with the Georgia Department of Transportation and CSX Transportation for construction and maintenance services for the Fairburn Road Bridge replacement.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute a local government lighting project agreement between the City of Atlanta and the Georgia Department of Transportation for lighting improvements for the Glenwood Avenue/SR 260 Pedestrian Lighting Project.
- Authorized the installation of traffic signals at the intersections of Simpson Street and Spring Street; Simpson Street and Williams Street; and Simpson Street and Centennial Olympic Park Drive to improve pedestrian and vehicle safety.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing the transfer of \$11,500,000 to provide adequate funding for acquisition of approximately 60 acres of land adjacent to Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport from Airport Station, LLC for runway protection and future airport development.
- Approved an ordinance exempting all utility relocation and construction-related activities associated with the Atlanta Streetcar Project from the prohibition against construction activity on arterial streets during peak traffic hours, for a period of eighteen (18) months, for the purposes related to completing the project by the federally imposed deadline.

In 2011 the Community Development/Human Resource Committee hosted presentations on various subjects, including the BeltLine Project, Atlanta Development Authority, Atlanta Housing Authority's Mission and Projects, Fort McPherson, Code Compliance, Federal Stimulus Funds, Commercial Tax Allocation Districts, Census Update, Centers of Hope, C5 Georgia Youth Program, Streetcar Project, Fulton County/Atlanta Land Bank Authority, Livable Centers Initiative, Georgia Flood Map, and Neighborhood Stabilization Program.

- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with Fulton County/City of Atlanta Land Bank Authority, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$4,416,082 to redevelop abandoned and foreclosed properties under the United State Department of Housing and Urban Development's Neighborhood Stabilization Program.
- Approved a resolution establishing the City of Atlanta's Tire Commission to study the problem of illegal tire dumping.
- Approved an ordinance decreasing the fee city residents pay to participate in the Camp Best Friends and After-School Tutorial Programs, and allowing the children and grandchildren of all City of Atlanta employees eligible for the After-School Tutorial Program at the same reduced cost that residents pay.

- Approved a resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with Asset Property Disposition Solutions, LLC in the amount of \$250,000 for the purpose of providing a comprehensive land inventory and analysis study to assist the City of Atlanta in making strategic investments to create new opportunities for affordable housing and sustainable economic opportunities within targeted communities.
- Approved a substitute ordinance allowing for the abatement of overgrown weeds and other junk, trash and debris on abandoned property by the City after notice and failure of the property owner to abate the violation or otherwise request adjudication in Atlanta Municipal Court, and to authorize the collection of abatement costs through billing and liens.
- Approved an ordinance allowing for the transfer of the Office of Code Compliance from the Department of Planning and Community Development to the Atlanta Police Department, and the renaming of the Office of Code Compliance to the Office of Code Enforcement.
- Approved an ordinance requiring owners of vacant properties to register with the City of Atlanta in an effort to improve code enforcement of such properties.

# City Utilities Committee



*The City Utilities Committee is responsible for the Departments of Watershed Management and Public Works (liquid waste and solid waste). This committee continues to make major policy decisions on wastewater and drinking water as a result of the Consent Decree and First Amended Consent Decree entered into 1998 and 1999, respectively, and storm water runoff. There is also some concern about the city's solid waste long term plans for dealing with the city's municipal waste. The Committee handles routine legislation such as abandoning and renaming of streets, water bill adjustments, sewer construction and connections, rights-of-way acquisitions, tie-back support systems, encroachment agreements, railroad crossing agreements, franchise agreements, street resurfacing and paving, sidewalk/curb construction and repair and other departmental needs. The Committee also makes recommendations on the nominees to be Commissioner of the departments of Public Works and Watershed Management, as well as to the People TV, Keep Atlanta Beautiful and Water and Sewer Appeal Boards. All of these issues and more were debated and decisions were made regarding each.*


