## The Case for the Atlanta Department of Labor & Employment Services

#### **Negative Trends in Federal Workforce Allocations**

The federal workforce development system is guided by the Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA), which was adopted in 2014. WIOA is based on 50 years of prior federal legislation establishing a network of Local Workforce Development Boards (LWDBs) across the country focused on creating and sustaining a skilled and productive labor force to meet the needs of local employers. WIOA is designed to strengthen and improve our nation's public workforce system by providing services to two equally important customers: job seekers and employers.

Annual funding distributed to Georgia to implement WIOA has been reduced by 30% over the past five years.

While the annual funding nationally has increased by 8% over the past five years, Georgia continues to receive less funding each year. This negative trend is tied directly to the outdated funding formula that has not been updated to meet current economic conditions and workforce priorities.

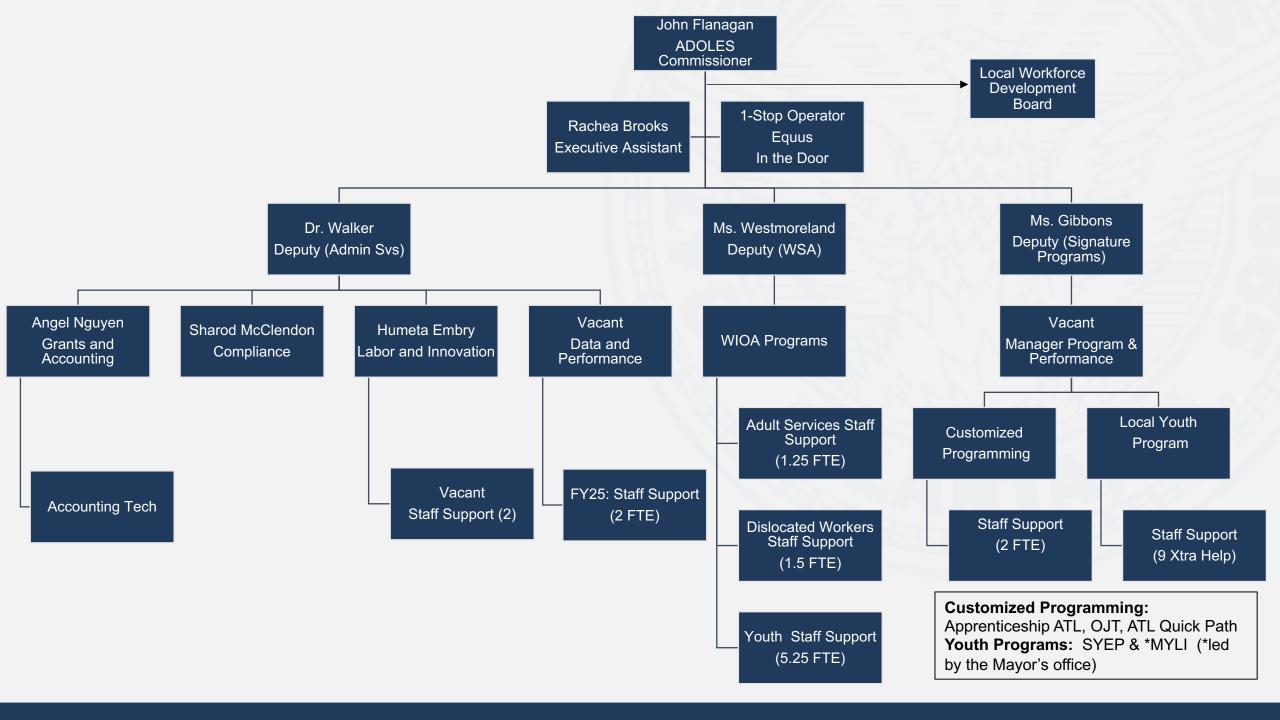

The Summer Youth Employment Program serves participants who meet the following criteria:

- Age between 14 24 years
- A resident of the City of Atlanta
- A Youth Work Permit (16 years and under)
- Successfully interview with the hiring managers
- Complete the SYEP onboarding process
- Meet all hiring prerequisites set by the employing entity
- Out-of-school youth participants, aged between 18 24, are eligible for full-time, permanent positions

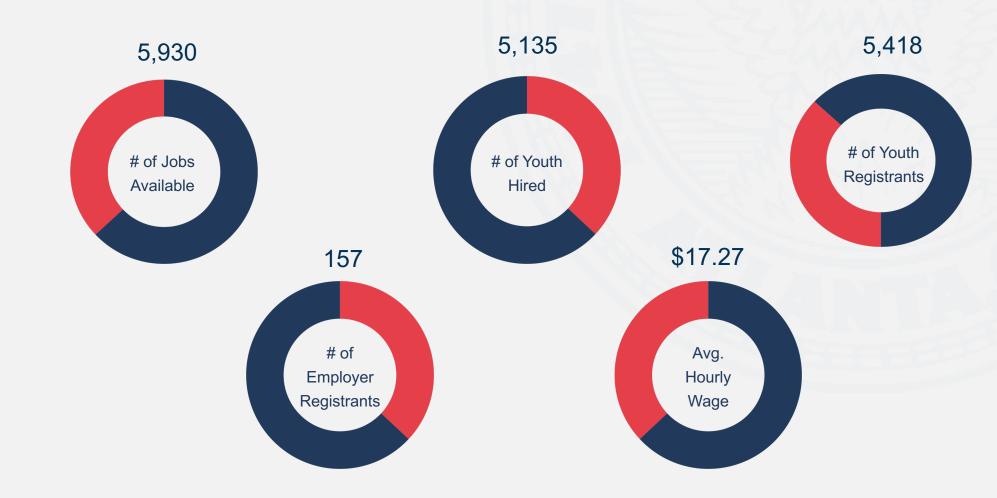

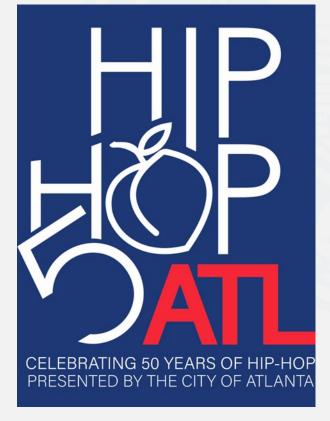
