COOPER STREET UPDATE

We've been actively engaged in this area for over a year, and several factors have led to us prioritizing it again, including

- the camp's growth
- incidents of crime and violence,
- our responsibility to address neighborhood concerns particularly regarding public safety and health issues.

Our goal is to compassionately close the encampments, and our timeline aims for mid to late September for the Cooper Street encampment.

To date, we have housed 64 individuals from the encampment.



PRYOR STREET UPDATE



Pryor Street has always been a priority for us due to the area's geography and the size of the encampment. While reported crimes are a concern, our focus is on addressing the situation comprehensively with creative solutions.

Our goal is to ensure that everyone in the encampment can be rehoused and that the site can be successfully closed

We have begun the assessment and engagement of individuals there.

The property is owned by Georgia DOT who is taking the lead on plans for mitigation in the area.
