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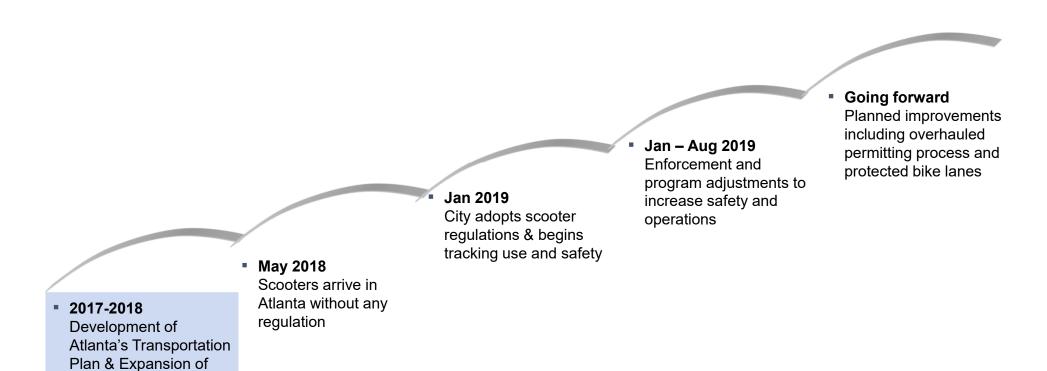
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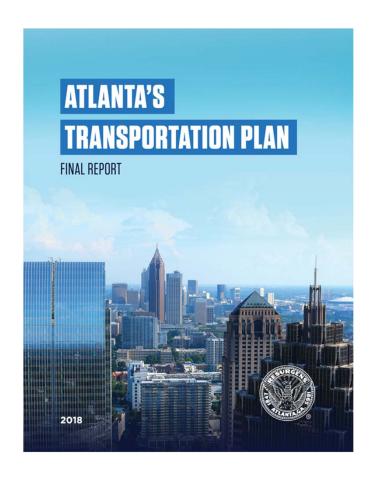

Multi-Modal **Mobility** Atlanta's roadways are near capacity with little room to grow. To maintain future access, we must maximize the use of our existing infrastructure and shift travel away from driving alone by increasing high-capacity transit options, building high-quality pedestrian and bicycle facilities, and concentrating density and development in the most suitable areas.

Safety

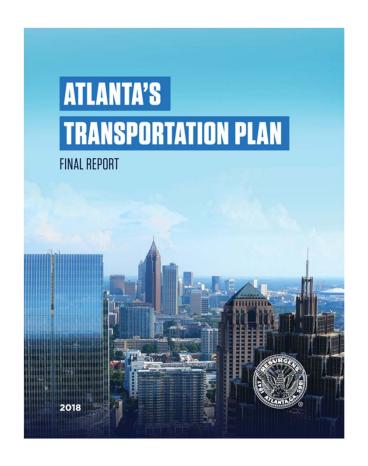
Too many vulnerable users - pedestrians, cyclists, and elderly, young, disabled, and low-income citizens - are injured on Atlanta's roadways. We must focus on improvements on the "High Injury Network", the 6% of the City's roadways where 42% of injuries and 72% of fatalities occur.

Equity

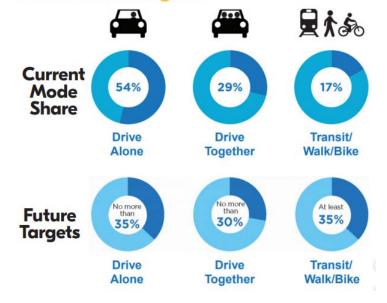
Driving is the most expensive form of transportation. We must expand transportation options throughout the City, especially for low-income households, to build an equitable system for all users.





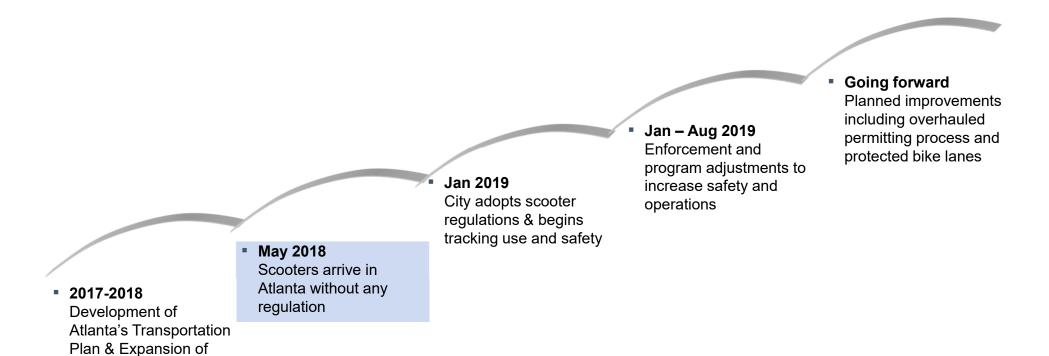

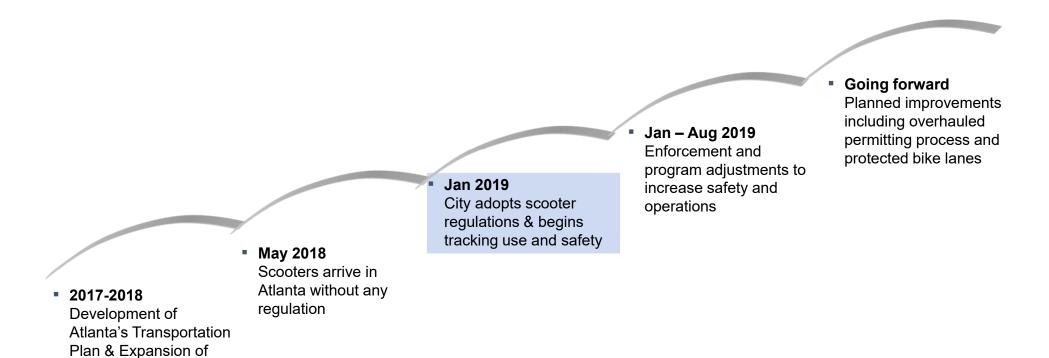

January 2019: Atlanta Adopts Scooter Regulations

Requirements of scooter companies:

- Pay permit fee
- Educate riders on safety and rules
- Limit device speeds to 15mph
- Share ride and safety data
- Manage parking of their fleet
- Devices need lights & reflectors
- Comply with no-ride zones, equity zones
 & other updated regulations

Requirements of scooter riders:

- No riding on sidewalks
- One rider at a time
- No cellphone use while riding
- Yielding to pedestrians
- Polite parking (i.e. NOT in the middle of the sidewalk)
- Follow rules of the road

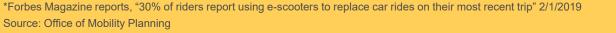

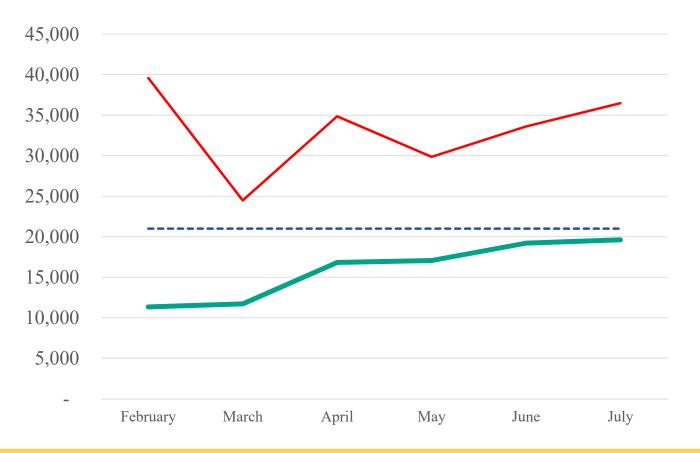

Trips Per Day continue to rise as popularity grows



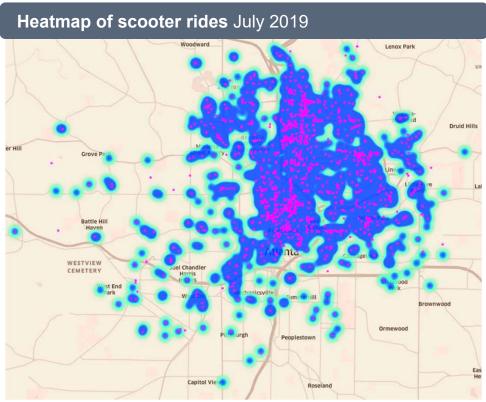
- Maximum Trips Per Day

- City monitors company adherence to their commitment

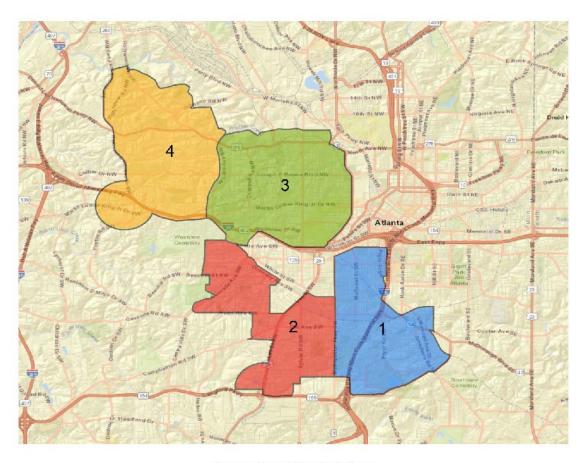


Figure 1. City of Atlanta Equity Zones



Safety

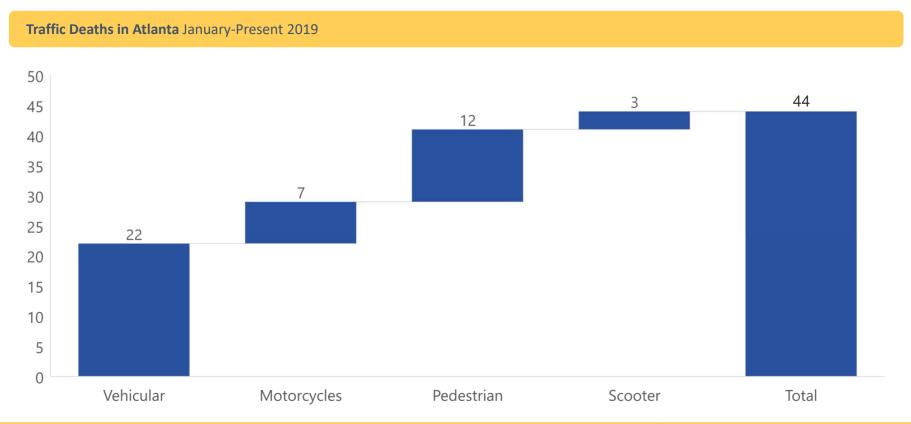
Companies report monthly updates of documented safety concerns, as well as any crashes or injuries reported by users or other community members.

Atlanta has experienced 44 traffic deaths in 2019, including 12 pedestrian and 3 scooter deaths







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The Bottoms Administation has deployed a number of enforcement and programmatic adjustments to improve safety and operations

Sidewalk enforcement

APD has issued 235 warnings and 21 citations for riding scooters on the sidewalk

Parking enforcement

The Department of Public Works has impounded 4,000+ scooters for illegal parking

Beltline Regulations

- City Planning introduced an 8mph limit for scooters on the Beltline
- Scooter parking zones with per company caps have been implemented

Limit on more scooters

 City adopted policy to not accept new scooter companies until permitting process can be updated

Nighttime ride ban

· City banned rented scooters from operating between 9pm and 4am

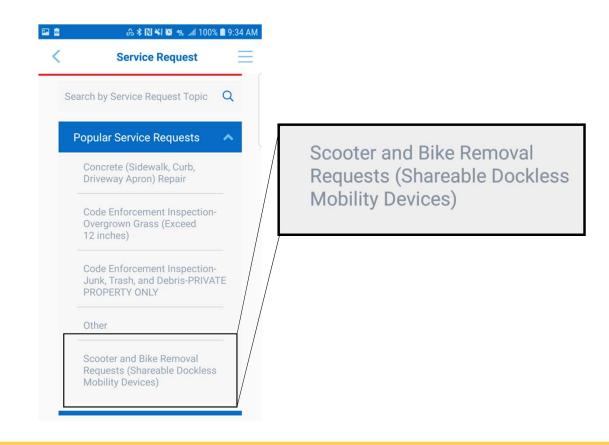
Education

- City installed more than 200 decals about no sidewalk riding and where to park scooters
- Departments and companies have had active community education efforts to educate riders





Improvements to 311 Reporting



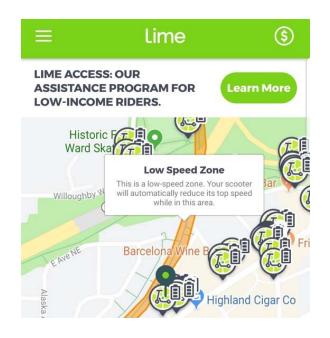

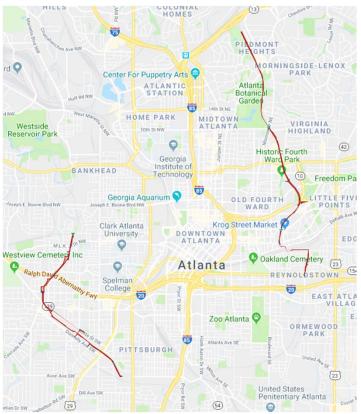

- Existing permits remain valid.
- Rules for riding and parking remain the same.

Nighttime No-Ride Zone

- Devices not rentable from 9:00PM-4:00AM
- Personal bikes, scooters, and Relay bikes are not subject to the restriction



Atlanta mayor: No more riding electric scooters and bikes after 9 p.m.

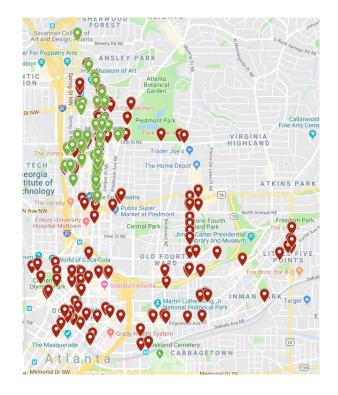

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Overhauling permitting process for scooter companies

- » Fewer companies to make program easier to manage
- » Currently reviewing practices from other cities



Best practice: Leverage tactical urbanism to "quick build" bike infrastructure

A QUICK-BUILD STREET PROJECT IS:

- » Led by a city government or other public agency
- » Completed within a year of the start of planning
- » Planned with the expectation that it may undergo change after installation
- » Built using materials that allow such changes
