

SOLID WASTE HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ **Scrap Tire Collection** In April, the Keep Atlanta Beautiful Commission, along with internal and external partners hosted the Semi-Annual Scrap Tire Drive. In total, 3,487 scrap tires were collected.
- ✓ **Dockless Mobility Devices (Scooters) Impounded** On average, our SWEET Officers have impounded 600-700 devices monthly which were illegally placed in the right-of-way (ROW).
- Scheduled Bulk Collection Scheduled bulk collection began April 1. Solid Waste Services' bulk collection capacity is 100 households per day. We have met capacity since the second day of the launch.



Solid Waste Services is now training employees on the use of Automated Side Loaders (ASLs) in the refuse fleet


Automated Side loaders (ASLs) will be deployed to service specified areas in the community to increase operational efficiency.

 Anticipate deployment in Fall 2019






SHAREABLE DOCKLESS MOBILITY DEVICES (SCOOTERS)






