






Purpose & Goals

- Ten-year vision for the provision of facilities, programs and services; parkland acquisition and development; maintenance and operations; and administration and management to elevate Atlanta's parks and recreation system into a world-class system.
- Integrate with the 'Atlanta City Design' values of access, equity, progress, ambition and nature, the 2030 Project Greenspace Plan, Urban Ecology Framework, and Resilient Atlanta.
- Living 'document' to communicate, educate and engage Atlantans on how the parks and recreation system is serving the needs of the city.
- Align with Mayor Bottoms' 'One Atlanta' agenda.

ActivateATL: Recreation and Parks for All!

- Via legislation 19-R-4726, the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) entered into a
 cooperative purchasing agreement with GAI Consultants, Inc., for the purpose of developing a
 compelling ten-year plan to elevate Atlanta's parks and recreation system into a world-class system.
- The comprehensive park and recreation system plan will provide recommendations for the provision of facilities, programs and services, parkland acquisition and development, maintenance and operations, and administration and management.
- The work to be performed under this contract would consist of professional services for the development of a parks and recreation ten-year comprehensive plan that will meet the Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) requirements. DPR anticipates completion within one year of contract execution.




- Community-driven Public Involvement!
- Full review of existing conditions of parks and recreation system;
- Demographic and Socio-economic Analysis;
- Trends, Opportunities, Challenges that will drive ten-year implementation plan to meet community needs;
- Level of Service Standards, Equity Analysis Needs assessment;
- Operational and Organizational assessment;
- Prioritized Capital Improvement Plan (5-year and 10-year) recommendations;
- Recreation programming plan that maximizes the use of facilities and parks, and meets community needs;
- Integrate Cities Connecting Children to Nature program grant;





Scope of Work: Blueprint for the Future Activate ATL: Recreation & Parks for All

- Data-driven recommendations and justification for strategic investments and improvements;
- Financially sound implementation strategy, functioning like a business plan;
- A master plan tracking tool to monitor progress to advance equity and investment in parks and recreation system in Atlanta;
- Inter-agency planning initiative to ensure that quality, well-maintained, accessible parks are critical public assets in our neighborhoods, and their expansion and improvement must be coordinated with other City-wide priorities;
- Funding Strategy to identify funding sources and processes to meet community needs.






