





- (range 1%-14%)







HIV/AIDS in DeKalb County

Board of Health

- DeKalb County ranks second in the state of Georgia regarding to its HIV burden.
- As of 2018, DeKalb County has a rate of nearly 1,400 per 100,000 people living with HIV.
- Among the new HIV infections (regardless of stage) diagnosed in DeKalb County as of 2018, about 76% occurred among African-Americans.
- Nearly half (42%) of all new HIV diagnoses in DeKalb County (2018) occurred in young persons who were between 20 and 29 years old.
- About 71% (unadjusted) of HIV transmission among PLWH in DeKalb (2018) was attributed to male to male sexual contact.

HIV/AIDS in Fulton County


- Among the 18 Public Health Districts in Georgia, Fulton and DeKalb had the highest numbers and rates of persons diagnosed with and living with HIV infection.
- As of 2018, Fulton County has a rate of nearly 1,600 per 100,000 people living with HIV.
- Among the new HIV infections (regardless of stage) diagnosed in Fulton County as of 2018, about 76% occurred among African-Americans.
- Nearly half (40%) of all new HIV diagnoses in Fulton County (2018) occurred in **young persons who were between 20 and 29 years old**.
- About 64% (unadjusted) of HIV transmission among PLWH in Fulton (2018) was attributed to male to male sexual contact.




Public Health...
