- Confident the City will deploy all Coronavirus Relief Funds within the required timeframe of December 30, 2020
- Natural delay in obligations and expenditures due to contract development, execution, and invoicing timelines
- Will continuously monitor and further revise allocations as needed to meet deadlines

Review of Best Practices from Major Cities



- A review of programs from other major cities was conducted to determine if other approaches should be considered during the reallocation process
- In general, most cities nationwide have implemented programs similar to those currently offered in Atlanta to address COVID-19's health and economic impacts:
 - Rental and mortgage assistance
 - Food security programs
 - Public health activities
 - Technology devices/internet access
 - Grants and technical support for small businesses
- Additionally, many cities have faced similar challenges when it comes to distributing CRF funds, including but not limited to:
 - Evolving federal guidance on the appropriate use of CRF funds
 - Lack of clarity around when/if future relief packages for local governments are forthcoming
 - Burdensome reporting requirements from the Department of Treasury
 - Looming deadlines for appropriating funds
 - Strict procurement/legislative requirements for appropriating funds

Governance and Next Steps



- Oversight and coordination for deployment of the funds will continue at the program and project level, including external consulting support:
 - Weekly Coronavirus Relief Fund program update meeting
 - Bi-weekly COVID-19 Cost Recovery Governance Committee
 - Department of Finance reports to City Council
- Based upon spend down rates, additional decisions will be made on reallocations by December 1st, with a focus on remaining funds being utilized on eligible payroll expenses
- There is a chance that the Department of Treasury will extend the timeline for deployment, but current planning is focused on a deadline of December 30th
