Challenges

As Atlanta grows, we know the need for parks and recreation services will become more pressing. We also know that the city faces a variety of changing conditions, many of which pose real challenges.

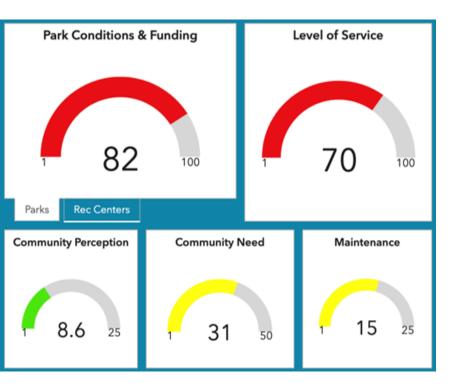

- Aligns with Mayor Bottoms' One Atlanta vision
- Measures and compares 15 health metrics across neighborhoods
- Uses data to prioritize parks and neighborhoods with the greatest need

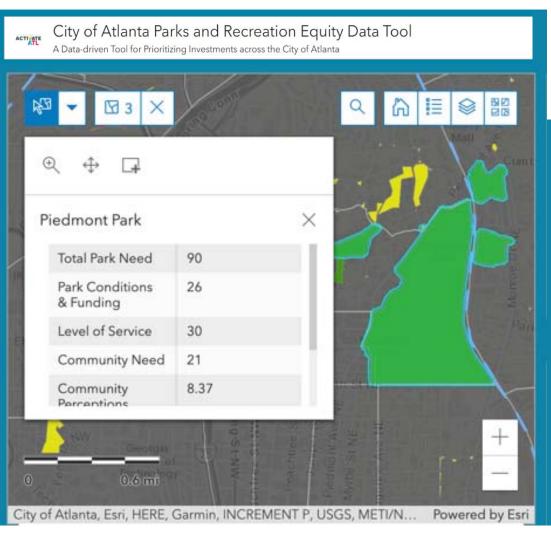




Data Includes:

- Private Funding
- Level of Service Score
- Physical Park Conditions
- Physical Rec Center Conditions
- Public Capital Improvement Funding
- Public Maintenance Funding
- Community perceptions (statistically valid surveys)
- Community Need Score
 - Includes demographics, safety, mobility and transportation access, physical environment, social and economic factors





Metrics May Include:

- Changes in community perception (short-term)
- Increased access to greenspace (short-term)
- Increases in life expectancy (long-term)
- Improved health outcomes (long-term)
