NPU Initiative

The NPU Initiative is a comprehensive study & review of Atlanta's historic Neighborhood Planning Unit (NPU) system led by the Center for Civic Innovation (CCI).

CCI believes that residents should have their voices and needs heard and valued in city decisionmaking processes.

Over the course of the Initiative, we have evaluated the purpose + roles, power + communication, structure + processes, and roles + capacity within and across the NPU system.

We reviewed these aspects of the System through the lenses of effectiveness, equity, accountability, and restoration for residents and other stakeholders.

The 14 recommendations presented today are a culmination of 2+ years of conversations, data, and key findings from the NPU Initiative.

Effective Equitable Accountable Restorative

Align on purposes and goals of the NPU system, including neighborhood organizations and APAB, so that all stakeholders within the system can perform their roles effectively within it.

Lead: Mayor + Council

Partners: NPUs, APAB, DCP, neighborhood organizations, etc.

Tactics:

- Schedule a series of community engagement activities to understand the roles and responsibilities of NPU stakeholders in terms of power, communication, capacity, etc.
- Host mediation sessions

Purpose of the NPU System/Process

1974 ordinance


"It is hereby found and declared that in order to be truly comprehensive, **City plans must be** responsive to the needs and concerns of citizens; that a plan which allows for diversified and responsive citizen involvement must be developed within the scope and content of the **Atlanta City Charter**; and that it is in the public interest to adopt this proposed plan by incorporating it as a new Chapter of the City Code."

1979 ordinance

this section of code remains unchanged in 2021 and is still found under the heading "Budget and Planning" "The Council finds that it is in the public interest for the City of Atlanta to have an organized program of neighborhood planning. It is the purpose of this article to provide an opportunity both for the citizenry formally to provide input into the comprehensive development plan of the City of Atlanta and to provide a means by which information concerning the operation of City Government can be provided to the citizens of Atlanta. Further, it is the policy of the City of Atlanta to coordinate the recommendations of neighborhood planning units with the formulation of the City's budget, both capital and operating, in order that the comprehensive development plan be an effective policy guide for the orderly development of the City."

The NPUs were part of the **Department of Budget** and **Planning**, sitting at the highest level of the City's administration





Increase funding for personnel and other resources for DCP and the NPU Team to proactively identify, evaluate, and assist in overcoming NPU shortcomings, provide immediate solutions to NPU problems, and support NPUs in conducting business as described in other recommendations.


Tactics:

- Quantify current spending on NPU system activities as a baseline and include as a line item in the City's annual operating budget
- Apply for federal and philanthropic grants related to civic/community engagement

Recommendation 3: Increase funding for personnel and other resources for DCP and the NPU Team.

NPU Support

City staffing dedicated for the NPU System has significantly fluctuated over time.



The City of Atlanta's neighborhood planning division started out with a dedicated staff of 18 – thanks, in part, to federal funding – responsible for NPU coordination and CDP development.



NPU staff was pared down to 2 – a coordinator and assistant.



Today, the NPU Team has 4 staff members and 1 vacancy. There is also an NPU Planner assigned to each NPU, but that role is a small fraction of their overall job.

"[NPU Chair], a lawyer, also said he and other NPU representatives who have certain business and professional skills can function without planners. They are also able to use their personal office staffs to perform NPU-related communication tasks once done by planners." – AJC story, 1985

"What are we supposed to do? We have no staff, we have no money, right? We get a grant every year — a grant. So we had to sit here and write for it. I spent about \$1,200 to get a postcard into every mailbox inside of the NPU. That was like a third of my budget — just to get one postcard. I really feel like we are a bit of a neglected rump of a department of the division of the City." — NPU Leader, 2020
