Introduction

The purpose of the Buckhead Public Safety Task Force was to respond to growing outrage and community concern over increasing crime, violence, and lawlessness in the Buckhead area. Atlanta City Councilmembers Mary Norwood and Michael Julian Bond put forth legislation (22-R-3001) for the Buckhead Public Safety Task Force (BPSTF). The BPSTF was a 90-day project enacted by the Atlanta City Council on January 18th, 2022. Valerie Sellers, retired Atlanta Police Sergeant and Buckhead resident, was selected as chairperson.

The BPSTF's primary objective was to convene stakeholders and partners to explore issues and influences on criminal incidents plaguing the community and to seek solutions. A second objective was to propose a crime reduction plan, crafted through use of feedback, suggestions, and recommendations from panelists, Task force members, and observers working together.

The BPSTF held six Zoom meetings with members of more than 20 representative groups and stakeholders from the community. Panelists presented expert information and offered recommendations on the root causes of Buckhead's alarming crime surge. During the meetings, panelists shared information about their area of expertise, and the influence or impact it has on crime in the area.

This report is the result of the activities of the Buckhead Public Safety Task Force and was compiled to share the information with citizens, neighbors, public and private stakeholders.

Presentations to the Panel

First Meeting

The first BPSTF meeting was held on February 10, 2022, at 6:30 PM. The meeting opened with remarks from members of the Atlanta City Council, the Committee Chair, and Mayor Andre Dickens, who pledged his full support and commitment to the Buckhead Public Safety Task Force. The first contributors were Deputy Chief Timothy Peek and Major Andrew Senzer of the Atlanta Police Department (APD), followed by Major Kendrick Lowe and Captain Richie Howard of the Georgia State Patrol (GSP).

The first presenter, Deputy Chief Peek, spoke about measures to provide police services in Buckhead and the rest of the city. Chief Peek presented an overview of crime in the city during 2020-2021, and shared data and analysis showing that beginning in July 2020, crime was up in every category (www.atlantapd.org). The 2020 COVID 19 shutdown originally caused some crimes, such as burglary, to trend downward. However, social unrest, violent and non-violent crimes soon began to rise throughout the city and in Buckhead.

Major Senzer reviewed data for 2020-2021that showed steady increases in Buckhead crime, though efforts in Zone 2 have decreased crime in the first quarter of 2022. Major Senzer has led the charge by cultivating relationships and utilizing all available tools and strategies to improve safety in the community.

Atlanta Police efforts to reduce Buckhead crime include:

- Reducing Part 1 Crimes, such as murder, aggravated assault, and burglary, to improve quality of life;
- Continuing vigorous apprehension and arrest of suspects;
- Understanding that crime and criminal activity in Buckhead is transient:

- Coordinating Zone level enforcement strategies, implementation, and deployment of personnel
- Opening the new Zone 2 Precinct with additional officers;
- Gathering community input and ideas regarding the most important issues;
- Increasing recruiting efforts to attract more officers;
- Strengthening partnerships with other law enforcement agencies, businesses and community groups, governmental and non-governmental agencies, and stakeholders throughout the public-private sector.

The Georgia State Patrol (GSP) was represented by Major Kendrick Lowe, the North Adjunct Commander, and Captain Richie Howard, Troop C Commander. One of the significant partnerships with APD is the Georgia State Patrol, who are approved by Governor Brian Kemp to collaborate closely with police to prevent crime in Buckhead. Major Lowe spoke about joining resources to combat street racing, drifting, and related traffic offenses that many citizens have complained about, along with violent and gun-related crimes that have risen in the Buckhead community.

The commitment to Zone 2 from Georgia State Patrol and other State law enforcement partners included:

- Troopers lend resources to the Buckhead area every weekend or upon APD request;
- GSP combines enforcement with Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI), Department of Natural Resources (DNR), and the Department of Community Supervision (DCS);
- Actively on call to pursue street and drag racers.

Questions and discussion from the panel following this session:

• APD manpower strength: recruitment, retention, the need for more officers;

- Effectiveness of police deployment and tools strategies;
- Benefits of Atlanta Police Foundation (APF), Buckhead Coalition, community, business, and Federal, State, and local law enforcement partnerships.

Second Meeting

The second BPSTF meeting took place on February 24, 2022, with presenters Jim Durrett, President of the Buckhead Coalition, Tony Peters, Capital Projects Implementation Manager for the Buckhead Community Improvement District (BCID), and Courtney Smith, Chairperson for Community Leaders on Enforcement Accountability and Responsibility (CLEAR).

Mr. Durrett began by recounting disturbing events in 2020 that sounded the alarm on crime in the community and prompted an initiative to create the Buckhead Security Plan (BSP).

The BSP was formed as a joint effort between the Atlanta Police Department (APD) the Atlanta Police Foundation, and several public-private sector stakeholders, including government officials, politicians, and neighborhood and civic organizations.

At the core of the Buckhead Security Plan is supplemental security patrols utilizing off duty APD officers, with the use of bike and vehicular patrols. Additional measures include enhanced detection and support in vulnerable locations with privately owned video cameras and license plate readers (LPRs). The LPRs can be integrated into the Video Integration Center (VIC) and are monitored by APD, which assists in crime reduction and investigations.

The BSP focuses on property and violent crimes, nuisance crimes, and other lawlessness causing great concern in the community and being widely reported in the media.

Mr. Durrett reviewed examples of crimes that the BSP focuses on, including:

- Shootings and violence near Buckhead shopping malls and major retail centers;
- Violence near restaurants and nightlife establishments;
- Slider crimes and carjackings at area gas stations;
- Street racing and drifting at intersections and main thorough ways;
- Teens (Water boys) aggressively approaching drivers to sell bottled water, while occupying and obstructing busy intersections:
- Thefts of vehicles, theft from vehicles, and vandalism of property.

Tony Peters, BCID Capital Projects Implementation Manager, discussed the importance of partnerships with the Buckhead Coalition, APF, and APD regarding the operational and funding portions of the Buckhead Security Plan.

Mr. Peters explained that BCID hires off duty APD officers and purchased new equipment to aid in their patrols throughout the BCID. The officers are responsible for general patrols and visibility in areas considered to be "hot spots." Some of the areas requiring the increased patrols are near Pharr Road and along the Piedmont corridor near Lindbergh Drive at the MARTA Transit Station.

Mr. Peters expressed the value of ongoing partnerships in the sustainability of the Buckhead Security plan and noted, "they are very expensive," yet with dedicated fundraising, will be extended.

Further, Mr. Peters offered that additional partnership projects with the Buckhead Coalition and the Atlanta Police Foundation, will be supported, such as one currently in the works; the opening of a new precinct in Buckhead at Peachtree and West Paces Ferry Roads.

Both Mr. Durrett and Mr. Peters emphasized that extra patrols offer increased visibility in Buckhead and have a positive impact on preventing crime in Zone 2. However, the benefits are limited to geographical areas within the BCID due to their charter.

The next presenter to the group was Courtney Smith, President of Community Leaders for Enforcement and Responsibility (CLEAR). Ms. Smith addressed problems and difficulties with alcohol licensing in the city and the negative impacts that they can have on crime. She highlighted difficulties in the City's application and review processes that, in many instances, allow bad operators who serve alcohol to avoid or ignore important requirements.

Ms. Smith explained to the Task Force members that the City's alcohol licensing process is flawed and outdated and could be manipulated by "bad actors", especially during the pandemic.

To address challenges with alcohol licensing, Councilmember Michael Julian Bond partnered with community members around the city to form the Atlanta Technical Advisory Group (ATAG 3). ATAG 3 will address historical and current issues related to alcohol licensing. ATAG 3 is charged to make necessary improvements to the city's policy, code, and procedure as they relate to alcohol licensing.

Ms. Smith made direct correlations between responsible nightlife practices and public safety, noting that the best outcomes can be achieved in the following ways:

- Fully staff the APD License and Permits Unit with police;
- Strengthen License and Review Board to act in special circumstances;
- Create a path where "Bad Actors" of clubs, who are permitted as restaurants, can be shut down;
- Improve the application process through automation and closing of loopholes.

Questions and discussion at the panel following this session:

- Propose policies geared toward accountability;
- Require nightlife establishments to commit to employee training practices;
- Require nightlife establishments implement safety plans as part of their business model.

Third Meeting

The third BPSTF meeting was held on March 8, 2022, with presenters Special Agent Ken Howard from the Georgia Bureau of Investigations (GBI) and Tom Ratchford, President of Formulytics, LLC Software Company, regarding increased gang activity around the State of Georgia, the City of Atlanta and in the Buckhead area.

Special Agent Ken Howard supervises gang investigations at the GBI and explained that although not centralized in Buckhead, gangs have hundreds of members operating in Georgia. Agent Howard presented data showing that many of America's most notorious gangs originated decades ago near southern California.

Special Agent Howard stated that gang crime was once thought to be a West Coast problem but is now a big problem in Georgia. GBI focuses efforts on identification, tracking and disruption of gang activities. Howard emphasized that partnerships with APD and other law enforcement agencies is critical to gang suppression.

Mr. Howard informed Task Force members that gangs impact crime and the quality of life in Buckhead and across Georgia by:

- Conducting drug deals;
- Committing thefts off all types;
- Strong arm and violent robberies;
- Human Trafficking;
- Gun violence and homicides.

The next presenter in the session was Tom Ratchford, President of Formulytics, LLC, an anti-gang software developer who works with multiple agencies, like the Department of Justice (DOJ) to track gang activity and help them build criminal cases for prosecution. Mr. Ratchford characterized the gang presence in Atlanta very widespread, sophisticated, and well-funded. He explained that gang influence reaches across the entire United States and all around the world and that gangs use their vast resources to recruit regularly to increase their membership.

Questions and discussion from panel following this session:

- Which gangs operate in the Buckhead area;
- Which gang crimes are the greatest danger to the community;
- Importance of prosecution of gangs at every level;
- Law enforcement dedicating specific resources to gang suppression;
- Importance of multi-jurisdictional collaboration in tracking and prosecuting gangs.

Meeting Four

The BPSTF fourth meeting was held on March 24, 2022, with presentations from Fani Willis, Fulton County District Attorney, and Patrick Labat, Fulton County Sheriff, on their commitments to collaborate and partner with the APD to fight crime in Buckhead.

DA Willis provided an analysis for murder cases in Fulton County and the City of Atlanta for 2021. She explained that there were significant increases in comparison to the previous year, and gang activity contributed to those increases.

DA Willis explained that her office has worked together with government officials, law enforcement agencies, judges, community organizations, educators, and members of the private

sector to address the growing presence of gangs and their influence on crime in our communities.

DA Willis has taken measures to ensure efficiency of prosecution by clearing the backlog of cases inherited from the previous administration, increasing her staff, and working to strengthen gang laws. To address the volume and complexity of cases, the DA's office has been restructured to include the operation of two Grand Jury's at one time, instead of one. DA Willis has initiated Gang Training for her staff and is partnering with stakeholders to track and prosecute repeat offenders.

With the improved measures, the Buckhead community will benefit, said Willis, because more offenders will be prosecuted and taken off the streets.

DA Willis reviewed the following goals for her office to combat crime in the community in 2022:

- Sponsor legislation to strengthen gang laws;
- Employ Formulytics software and new technologies to streamline information on gangs;
- Complete new storage facility for prosecutorial evidence;
- Administer Justice classes and diversion programs to guide youth away from the lure of gangs;
- Promote Court Watch program to assure transparency.

Sheriff Pat Labat was the next presenter; whose responsibility is to protect the Fulton County Courts and manage operations at the Fulton County Jail. The Fulton County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) also plays a prominent role in public safety and as one of the stakeholders in the community, lends resources and manpower to fighting crime in the Buckhead area.

Sheriff Labat said he is actively fighting crime all over Fulton County in partnership with the Atlanta Police Department and other

departments. The FCSO works with APD, to deter, detect, and apprehend criminals by deploying Crime Suppression and K-9 Units in the Buckhead community.

In addition to enforcement related activities, Sheriff Labat places emphasis on community projects that focus on diverting individuals from crime and gangs and tackling recidivism.

Sheriff Labat is dedicated to continuing efforts in the Buckhead community by:

- Supporting technological advances and integrating systems utilizing FUSUS (Real-Time Crime Center);
- Offering greater accessibility from the community on Fulton County Sheriff's Office online app;
- Recruiting and hiring additional officers to increase available coverage in the community.

Questions and discussion from panel following this session:

• Improvement of court practices to get criminals to trial in a timely manner and sentenced appropriately.

Meeting Five

The fifth BPSTF meeting was held on April 7, 2022, and Task Force members heard from five (5) speakers during the session. The first presentation was made by Chief Judge Christopher Brasher of Fulton County Superior Court who gave a brief overview of the status at Fulton Superior Courts. Judge Brasher detailed the types of cases being handled in the courts and what challenges emerged during Covid and are persisting today. Judge Brasher noted that from March 2020 until April 2021 courts had been operating virtually, creating a backlog in indictments of jail inmates.

The next presentation was from Chief Judge Cassandra Kirk of Fulton County Magistrate Court. Judge Kirk spoke about the responsibilities of Magistrate Court and the type of functions the magistrates perform there. She explained that many cases heard at Magistrate Court are civic actions or small claims but may also be preliminary or health court hearings. A significant portion of cases are first appearance felony cases, where criminals may be bound over to pretrial, released on bond, or released on their own supervision. Judge Kirk said because the court is open 365 days a year 24/7, and no jury trials are held, most cases proceed quickly.

The third presenter was Chief Judge Christopher Portis of Atlanta Municipal Court who told Task Force members about Municipal Court structure, operation, and case management. Judge Portis noted that cases specific to Atlanta are cycled through the courts and include hearings on city ordinances and traffic violations.

Like other organizations, said Judge Portis, city courts fell behind in functions and operations due to Covid protocols, so they are working to clear increased caseloads.

Judge Portis told the group that the court has several alternative sentencing measures available, depending on an offender's circumstances and the nature of their violation.

Regarding the rise in nuisance crimes like street racing, Judge Portis offered that he and other municipal judges would be adopting a Zero Tolerance policy, aimed at showing the court's seriousness and hopefully deterring future violators.

The fourth presentation was from Chief Judge Juliette Scales of Fulton County Juvenile Court, who as one of eight justices at Juvenile Court is tasked with complex issues involving youth that stem from delinquency, drug dependence, emancipation, and truancy. Judge Scales works together in partnership with the department of juvenile justice on more serious cases and criminal

offenses involving youth which are mitigated through several programs and measures available to the court.

The fifth and final speaker was MARTA Police Chief Scott Kreher. Chief Kreher, a former APD Commander, understands the crime profile in Buckhead and is committed to the partnership that benefits stakeholders and both departments. Chief Kreher explained that MARTA has a large presence in Buckhead, with its headquarters on Piedmont Road, in addition to rail stations located within the community.

Chief Kreher spoke about staffing challenges in his department, decreased ridership on trains and buses, maintenance of safety and quality of life issues, particularly with homeless individuals, since the Covid outbreak in 2020. Chief Kreher authorized his officers to conduct joint crime suppression details with Zone 2 by utilizing Bike Patrols and off duty police. MARTA Police also supports enforcement strategies in the community and is dedicated to continued efforts to close coverage gaps and address future crime needs.

Questions and discussion from panel following this session:

- Concern over violent criminals obtaining bond too quickly without consideration for the danger to the community;
- Lax or no punishment for violators of street racing and nuisance crimes;
- Accountability for juvenile crime and gang affiliation.

Meeting Six

The sixth BPSTF meeting of the series was held on April 21, 2022, and the Task Force learned that Major Senzer had been promoted to Deputy Chief and re-assigned. To continue participation and efforts in this work group and in the community, newly promoted Major Ailen Mitchell was assigned as Zone Two Commander.

Presenters for meeting six were Greg McNiff, Vice President of Programs at the Atlanta Police Foundation, Mary Norwood, Atlanta City Council, Denise Starling, Executive Director of Livable Buckhead, and Lindsey Jones, Director of Marketing for Lenox Square.

Mr. McNiff spoke about the ongoing efforts of the organization to bring awareness to technology and services that can make Buckhead safer. Mr. McNiff explained that through APF's Connect Atlanta, public and private entities can register their surveillance cameras with the Atlanta Police Department so that APD can request footage from these cameras when an incident has occurred nearby. The owner of the camera gives the department's Video Integration Center (VIC) their permission to monitor the requested footage.

Mr. McNiff reviewed opportunities for businesses and security companies wanting to improve communication amongst themselves about crime, or relay information between groups, they can, for a nominal fee, subscribe to Comnet which provides radios that transmit directly into the APD's 911 call center.

As a partner with numerous public-private partnerships, charitable and law enforcement agencies, Mr. McNiff is actively engaged in APF fundraising with the goal to bring more technology to Buckhead to assist police in crime fighting efforts. The APF also funds the rewards offered through Crime Stoppers to assist in apprehension of criminal suspects.

The panel's next speaker was Councilwoman Mary Norwood, who proposed the idea of expanding Buckhead security patrols in order to provide seamless off duty police protection beyond the borders of the Buckhead Community Improvement District.

With the guidance and support of the Buckhead Coalition, the Atlanta Police Foundation and community partners, Norwood said

she believes gaps of coverage can be closed to consistently drive crime out of Buckhead.

The plan would consist of:

- Off-duty Atlanta police patrols beyond the boundaries of the BCID;
- Additional of cameras and LPRs throughout Buckhead;
- Memberships in Connect Atlanta and Operation Shield.

Our next presenter was Denise Starling, Executive Director of Livable Buckhead, a nonprofit organization in Buckhead whose efforts are rooted in sustainability, greenspace, and quality of life, and plays a role in executing the Buckhead Security Plan. One of the largest campaigns that Mrs. Starling promotes is the *Clean Car Campaign*, which uses messaging and communications to encourage drivers to remove valuables from visibility when they park their cars in Buckhead, to reduce vehicle break-ins and vandalism.

Additional programs that Ms. Starling oversees:

- Security Council a quarterly meeting of the security directors for all commercial properties in Buckhead, Zone 2, and MARTA. It facilitates relationships and promotes knowledge sharing to create a force multiplier for APD;
- Providing of a housing subsidy to help police officers live in Buckhead;
- Path 400 a 5.2 mile greenway that includes a partnership with APD for bike patrols and security cameras.

The final contributor for the session was Lindsey Jones, who showed a video presentation narrated by Russ Tuttle of Simon Properties, who owns Lenox Square. The video highlighted security practices in place at Lenox Square, which has one of the largest security programs in Buckhead and works closely with APD

and many public and private partners to ensure the best safety practices on their property.

Ms. Jones explained that the Simon group has invested heavily in their Operations Intelligence Center, where property cameras can be viewed in real time from a remote location. There are hundreds of cameras and license plate readers at Lenox and at Phipps Plaza, which is also owned by Simon, all of which are linked and shared with APD.

Lenox Square Mall is doing several things to maintain safety on the property. They include:

- 24/7 security patrols by off duty police and private security;
- K-9 patrols and technology systems to detect firearms;
- Youth Supervision Policy to combat delinquent and/or unattended minors;
- Security escort to parking lot;
- Police Precinct substation located on the property;
- Website <u>www.simon.com</u> for customer support and a list of all safety measures.

Questions and discussion from panel following this session:

- Concern for crime breaking through security measures;
- Exploration of crime and criminal behavior as more than a police problem;
- Combating future Buckhead crime through continued teamwork.

Recommendations and Suggestions

After evaluating the information presented during the sessions, the panel members and observers made the following recommendations for lowering crime in the community and sustaining a safer Buckhead for the future.

- Fully staff the APD License and Permits Unit with officers;
- Strengthen License and Review Board to act in special circumstances;
- Create a path where "Bad Actors" of clubs, who are permitted as restaurants, can be shut down;
- Improve the alcohol licensing process through automation and closing of loopholes.
- Improve APD recruitment and hiring to increase staffing;
- Coordinate APD crime fighting strategies in Buckhead;
- Support APD and GBI gang analysis and investigation;
- Expand camera and LPR network and integration;
- Continue multi-agency response and coordination fighting crime and street racing;
- Staff nighttime police operations to deter violence crime and street racing;
- Empower the Fulton District Attorney's use of gang laws for prosecution;
- Continue efficiencies in Fulton DA's clearing of case backlog;
- Expand off-duty security patrols beyond the BCID boundaries:
- Recognize that the social aspects of crime are more than a police issue;
- Support reforms to modernize the City's alcohol license processes;
- Increase accountability and responsibly of establishments that serve alcohol;

- Lobby for City of Atlanta Jail to reduce overcrowding at Fulton County;
- Promote new and existing programs addressing repeat offenders;
- Strengthen campaigns (Clean Car Campaign and Crime Stoppers) to increase awareness and aid police efforts;
- Enhance observance of court activities in reference to bail, sentencing, outcomes;
- Continue partnerships that make Buckhead safer and review regularly;
- Create working group of Buckhead neighborhoods with offduty security to meet to share best practices;
- Sponsor legislation to strengthen gang laws;
- Employ Formulytics software and new technologies to streamline information on gangs;
- Complete new storage facility for District Attorney's prosecutorial evidence;
- Administer Justice classes and diversion programs to guide youth away from the lure of gangs;
- Promote Court Watch program to assure transparency.

Buckhead Public Safety Task Force Security Plan

The Plan

For the purposes of a safer community and with the input from participants and contributors to the Buckhead Public Safety Task Force, the following plan was proposed to address current and ongoing crime issues in the area.

Current Security Patrols and Camera Coverage Status

Buckhead Neighborhoods

- Security Patrols and Camera integration 76%
- Security Patrols or Cameras/LPR's 97%

Existing supplemental security patrols in the Buckhead CID:

- Bike patrol in the Lindbergh area
- Vehicle patrols along BCID properties

To improve auxiliary APD patrols and Community Policing:

- Increase boots on the ground by Atlanta Police Department through recruitment and hiring (250 + Officers)
- Regularly assign/deploy officers (not 911 Primary) in high traffic, commercial, entertainment areas of Buckhead
- To raise police profile, coordinate on duty and off duty details aimed at community policing efforts
- Fortify boundaries at jurisdictional lines through joint efforts with neighboring departments

The plan will improve and expand Buckhead security patrols and camera integration to 100 percent, through the expansion of security patrols to outside of the BCID area.

The plan will add commercial corridors for off duty patrols:

- Northside Parkway at Moores Mill up the city limits (Chattahoochee River);
- Howell Mill at Collier Road South to the Buckhead Southern boundary;
- Peachtree Road at Brookwood Station North to the BCID Southern border
- Roswell Road at the BCID Northern border to the city limits;
- Peachtree Road at the BCID Eastern border to the city limits.

Include four levels of membership for expanded patrols:

- Corporate
- Retail
- Neighborhood
- Institutional

Benefits of Membership

- 1. Decal for participants;
- 2. Access to Connect Atlanta (surveillance cameras): FUSUS;
- 3. Access to Comnet radio dispatch communications;
- 4. Supplemental security patrols;
- 5. Phone number access provided for supplemental security patrols.

Conclusion

The Buckhead Public Safety Task Force project highlighted critical components of the criminal justice system and showed that cooperation combined with community partnerships, can serve everyone more efficiently.

The sharing of communication between different entities and individuals was crucial to those who participated on the task force to show a unified response against lawlessness to secure a safer Buckhead.

It was also clear that each member of the Task Force cared for and respected the quality of life everywhere and were willing to work together by sharing strategies, resources, and tools with others to make things safer and better. The success and sustainability of safety in Buckhead depends on keeping the lines of communication open and by showing that words can and must become "actions".

The BPSTF allowed a forum for community stakeholders to engage with experts in dialog about how crime and criminal issues can be identified, deterred and in many instances, disrupted.

Surely, the Task Force gave an opportunity to connect with others who are dedicated to preserving the quality and standard of life in Buckhead, but more importantly, became an initiative that presented crime as much more than a "police issue," which should stand as a model that can be utilized anywhere.
